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

On my first visit to St. Lawrence, I was a candidate for the order." He came to know of St. Lawrence Seminary through the Capuchin Franciscans. The appearance of Capuchin Franciscans here at SLS is vital; they serve as examples of St. Francis of Assisi, who greatly influences the values that SLS upholds.

Br. Brenton was welcomed when he joined the faculty in 2019. "The community was very kind and helpful. They helped me get settled in and helped with anything I needed," he noted. He greatly enjoyed the hospitality shown by both the students and the staff. In addition, Br. Brenton said that he loves the scenery around St. Lawrence. Br. Brenton holds a number of responsibilities on the Hill. He is the Campus Minister for the school, working to prepare different liturgical events throughout the year, making sure that evening prayer goes smoothly every night. As he approached it, he made the sign of the cross toward it and said, "Come, brother wolf. In the name of Christ, I order you not



to hurt anyone." At that moment, the wolf was tamed. Francis explained to the wolf how it had been terrorizing the people of Gubbio, and that he wanted to restore peace. The wolf, in return, told to Francis its story. Francis listened and then proposed a solution to the problem. As Francis extended his hand to the wolf, the wolf extended its paw and placed it into Francis' hand. Both returned to the city, walking side by side. The people saw it and were amazed. With the wolf at his side, Francis went on to preach about repentance and forgiveness. Moved by what they saw and heard, the townsfolks promised to provide food for the wolf. The wolf, in return, promised not to threaten the people anymore. From that day on, the people and the wolf lived together in harmony and peace was restored.

This story reminds us that repentance and forgiveness are necessary for peace. When we are honest in acknowledging the wrong we have done, sincere in our contrition, and humble in asking for forgiveness, and when we are generous in forgiving others, then peace will reign—not only in our hearts, but in our homes in our communities as well.

This month, as we celebrate the life and legacy of Saint Francis, and as we make our journey into this new school year, I would invite us to reflect on our willingness and our readiness to repent and forgive. Let us pray for the grace and strive to grow in these virtues, so that like Saint Francis, we may become channels of God's peace in our world.






