






Fr. Jack Tierney, an SLS graduate of the Class of 2009, is the newest member of SLS's Ministry Council. Fr. Jack had an initial interest in becoming a priest when he first enrolled at SLS as a student. The environment and the institution around him contributed to the reason he became a priest.

Fr. Jack became a member of the Ministry Council upon the recommendation of Rector Fr. Zoy Garibay. In order to give back to the community that he loves and create an environment that is enjoyable and pleasant, to not only students but also everyone, he decided to join the Ministry Council. His job is to help improve policies, further the school's mission and values of safe community, spirituality, social skills, humble commitment, knowledge, and diversity; and to serve as an advisory body to the Rector/President.

Fr. Jack's favorite memory as a student at SLS was when there was a snowball fight by the upper ball diamond. He quoted, "Even though the seniors could pick on small targets like the freshman, they decided to join the freshman class and throw snowballs at the junior and sophomore classes." He will never forget the unwritten SLS motto that community building is crucial. His passion toward the Capuchins and his alma mater has stayed strong, even after he became an Augustinian.







Ministry, a core element in the lives of all St. Lawrence Seminary students, has had a long tradition at SLS. The task of organizing and coordinating the ministry program is a huge one, and currently Dr. Michael Donahou, a religion teacher for the upperclassmen, has taken it on.

Ministry, on and off the Hill, is typically conducted at the grade level. The seniors, as the leaders of the school, handle ministries that are sensitive and require maturity. One such ministry is Special Olympics bowling, which sheds a shining light on an often-ignored segment of our communities in the special needs athletes. Seniors do their best to encourage and cheer for the participants to make sure they are having fun. Another ministry opportunity offered to the seniors is through the ACTS Housing Program, which helps people with home rehab coaching for those who decide to take on a fixer-upper. The seniors also volunteer at Hospice Home of Hope, serving meals to terminal patients in Fond du Lac.

On Friday nights, the juniors can typically be found helping at Broken Bread, a food pantry in Fond du Lac, where they distribute food to those in need and help with the cleanup process. Because of COVID, the school ended a long relationship with the Villa Loretto, a nursing home in Mt. Calvary, where sophomores spend time with the elderly and help with Bingo games. Instead, now the sophomores go to Fond du Lac where they have a similar experience at the St. Francis Home. In all, there a wide variety of ministries offered to SLS students; others include the St. Peter Claver Fish Fry, the St. John the Baptist Church County Fair Fundraiser, the Halloween Cave Tour, and more.

A major ministry done school wide is the Prison Fellowship Angel Tree Program, which involves purchasing gifts for children of incarcerated parents. The faculty and staff volunteer to supervise the students in each part of the ministry and make calls to the guardians for the child's wish list. The seniors deliver the gifts bought by the juniors. The sophomores wrap the gifts and the freshmen write letters to the parents of the children who receive them. Another ministry opportunity new to the SLS this year is the Capuchin Toy Drive, where our school has agreed to make 500 wooden toys for families to receive at Christmas.

When asked why ministry? Dr. Donahou reminds us of our mission statement, 'Inspired by the Gospel of Jesus Christ.' "Hence, the gospel and the works of Jesus Christ's actions inspire all of our ministries. The Ministry program at SLS allows the students to view the world in a different perspective." Through these experiences, Dr. Donahou hopes that once students leave, they will continuously look for ways to make the world a better place by helping people through ministry.

Two Capuchin Franciscan friars founded St. Lawrence Seminary, and they built the school based on the teachings of St. Francis of Assisi. Being their patron saint, the Capuchins pay special attention to commemorating the great saint. The unique celebration of St. Francis's death is the Transitus service.

Held on the eve of the saint's feast day, the SLS Transitus celebration started with friars of the seminary marching into the chapel, holding candles. The seniors then read to the congregation the stories and legends of St. Francis. Towards the end of the service, loaves of bread were passed around in remembrance of Christ's last supper. Once the final story was read, teachers, friars, and alumni sang Psalm 142, with the melody written by a former friar of SLS. Commenting on his first Transitus at SLS, Fr. Peter Kafumu said, "It was eye opening for me to see how Transitus was done. Where I am from, the friars always dramatized the saint's life. But it was great to see how those stories were narrated here, and songs were sung between each one."

The following day, October 4th, SLS students and staff gathered for a noontime Mass to celebrate the feast day of St. Francis. The Mass was a poignant display of the impact of St. Francis not just on the Church, but also on communities and individual people. After the liturgy, members of the SLS community were treated to an Italian banquet prepared by Flik, SLS's new food service provider. The Feast of St. Francis is held near and dear to the Capuchins, and they impart their admiration of the saint to students of St. Lawrence. For many students, this was the first time they experienced a service like the Transitus. Through St. Francis, lay people can learn to love Brother Sun, Sister Moon, and all that is in between, just as God loves them.
