Letter from the Rector

When I was a little boy I enjoyed going to birthday parties. I found them to be a lot of fun. There was good food, plenty of desserts, balloons of different colors, fun games, and lots of giveaways. Some of the gifts I received as a child, I used quite often. But there were others that ended up on the shelf to be displayed or put inside a box and hidden inside a closet. What a shame that was!

On Sunday, May 19, the Church will celebrate the Solemnity of Pentecost. Pentecost is traditionally known as the birthday of the Church. On this day, more than two thousand years ago, the Church was born. The Book of Acts, recounts the event in which the disciples of Jesus gathered together in one place, when suddenly, tongues of fire descended upon them and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit emboldened the disciples and enabled them to speak in different tongues "to proclaim the mighty acts of God" to the whole world (Acts 2:1-4). And in the penultimate chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus said to his disciples, "Receive the Holy Spirit." (John 20:22). The Holy Spirit then is God the Father's and God the Son's precious gift—the heavenly "giveaway"—to the disciples of Jesus and to those who come after them—those who are baptized in to the faith.

The Catechism teaches us that the Holy Spirit comes to us with its own gifts: wisdom, knowledge, understanding, counsel, fortitude, piety (or reverence), wonder and awe (or holy fear of the Lord). Wisdom enables us to see the world and others through God's eyes. It helps us to recognize the value of creation and the dignity of every human being as a child of God. Knowledge enables us to think about God's revelation and to recognize that there are mysteries of faith that is beyond our grasp. Understanding enables us to comprehend the meaning of God's message. Counsel allows us to help others see God's plan and assist them in following it. Fortitude is the courage to do what is right—what is God's will—even when it is difficult. Piety allows us to devote ourselves totally to God. And finally, wonder and awe (or Fear Holy Fear of the Lord) allows us to marvel at God's divine majesty and God's mighty deeds in our lives.

We received God's precious gift of the Holy Spirit along with its particular gifts on the day of our Baptism. As Jesus sends forth his disciples, so too we are sent to proclaim the Good News to the whole world, with the Holy Spirit as our advocate and guide. These Gifts that the Holy Spirit will embolden us and enable us to accomplish what Jesus has commissioned us to do. So let us not leave those gifts hidden or underutilized. Instead, let us put them to good use. Let us use them for the good of our community, the Church, and our world. Let us use them to build up the Kingdom of God in our midst. That would be a good way of honoring God's generosity and a good way of commemorating the birthday of our Church.

Trip to Deutschland

Due to COVID the SLS German students haven't gone on the Germany trip since March 2020. Finally, on February 29, ten upper class level German students and two chaperones made the voyage to Frankfurt, Germany to visit our partner school, Collegium Johanneum (die Loburg). Mr. David Naegele and Mr. Anthony Van Asten, along with the ten students, traveled by train from Frankfurt to Ostbevern, Germany, where the group resided with die Loburg host families for the duration of the trip.

During the stay in Germany, the students did not only experience the German language, but were also given many opportunities to experience their culture and the food. Mr. Van Asten said, "The German exchange provides our students an invaluable experience to see what life is like outside of the U.S. We can become so isolated in the U.S. and think our reality is everyone's reality. This experience allows us to see things from an international perspective. From their education system, their transportation infrastructure, their holiday customs, cultural traditions, and diet." German 3 student, Cristian Cruz ('25) was asked about his experience and stated, "I attended a carnival in Münster, visited Cologne where we went to the Lego store, and ate pizza. We saw the amazing Cologne Cathedral and we went bowling together one day. After school, we engaged in a lot of sports activities with the German students." Because the SLS students stayed with different host families, each student may have experienced different opportunities. However, since the host families lived in close proximity of each other and were friends, most experienced the same activities after school and on the weekends. A unique experience, everyone attended a professional soccer game between Bayer Leverkusen and Wolfsburg.

Aside from the numerous activities, the SLS students also were able to see many cultural and classroom differences between the U.S. and Germany. Die Loburg classrooms for example, teachers seem to focus on developing student's critical and analytical thinking skills by using a discussion format and engaging in debates. This differs from the SLS classrooms, as our teachers use a lecture format. The food in Germany was exceptionally good, they eat much healthier and the proportions were sometimes much smaller. A traditional German meal is Weiner Schnitzel, served with potatoes and cabbage. The transportation is very different as well, Germans rely on public transportation, trains, rather than taking a personal vehicle. The architecture in this area of Germany is also guite different, many buildings look castle like and many look old.

The trip was a fantastic opportunity for students to experience Germany and it also continues the amazing connection between die Loburg and Saint Lawrence Seminary. Next spring the students from Germany will visit SLS to keep the tradition going.


But Wait... There's MORE?





